

Walker River Indian Reserve  
August 15, 1872

Dear Sister

It has been so long sine I heard from you that I came near forgetting you altogether. Probably I have forgotten to answer your last. As usual we are having hot weather the mercury aspiring to about 100, everyday as a felief the nights are refreshingly cool.

Good health prevails and the country generally prosperous. – You have never informed me how you came out in your lawsuit – I hope you have been successful – I would be willing to spend a few hundred if by so doing revenge could be obtained against the Kansas Campbells. I received \$3000 of the Government a few days since which has been due me for several years – I don't think it fortunate that I have got it but unfortunate that I did not receive it years ago when it was due. That amt invested in cattle three years ago would have amounted to quite a respectable sum – My horses and cattle are thriving well I have forty head of young colts and eight head of calves. Next year I will have 50 mule colts.

Raising stock in this country is an easy way of making money.

Give my regards to Brother John and all the rest of the folks.
